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**HISTORIC FOUR DAY CAMPAIGN SCHOOL FOR WOMEN POLITICAL LEADERS  
FROM MIDDLE EAST & NORTH AFRICA ENDS TODAY**

KUWAIT -- After four intensive days, a groundbreaking gathering in Kuwait of more than 50 women from across the Middle East and North Africa wraps up today with a special closing ceremony.

U.S. Congresswoman **Jane Harman**, senior Democrat on the House Select Committee on Intelligence will deliver the keynote address to participants in the *Partners in Participation Regional Campaign School*. Before receiving their certificates of completion, participants will also hear from **Dr. Rola Dashti**, President of the Kuwait Economic Society, **Shaikha Al-Nusf**, President of the Kuwait Women's Social and Cultural Society, and **Les Campbell**, NDI Regional Director for the Middle East and North Africa.

Over the course of the program, participants shared experiences, learned how to run political campaigns and worked towards building a regional network of women with the skills to succeed in politics over the long term. They also heard from keynote speakers, including **Massouma Al-Mubarak**, Kuwait's Minister of Planning and Minister of State for Administrative Development, **Kim Campbell**, former Prime Minister of Canada, **Samia Moualfi**, Member of Parliament from Algeria, and **Amina Ouchelh**, Member of Parliament from Morocco.

Participants included elected members of parliament, cabinet members, civil society leaders and journalists from **Algeria, Bahrain, Egypt, Iraq, Jordan, Kuwait, Lebanon, Mauritania, Morocco, Oman, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, West Bank/Gaza and Yemen.**

The campaign school was organized by the National Democratic Institute for International Affairs (NDI), in cooperation with the Kuwait Economic Society's Women's Committee, the Women's Social and Cultural Society in Kuwait, and the International Republican Institute (IRI).

It was held against the backdrop of upcoming elections throughout the region, including Iraq, Jordan, Algeria, the West Bank and Gaza, and Kuwait, where women won the right to vote earlier this year. While there are more women than ever before running for office and being elected in the region, obstacles remain. Many of the participants who came to Kuwait are themselves candidates in election campaigns.

The *Partners in Participation Regional Campaign School* was the fourth in a series of events sponsored by the Middle East Partnership Initiative (MEPI).
