Methodology

- A total of 1,780 interviews were conducted in Serbia and Montenegro between September 30 and October 2.
 - 1,120 interviews were conducted in Serbia
 - 660 interviews were conducted in Montenegro

Methodology

- The margin of error for Serbia is +/- 2.93 percent and greater for subgroups.
- The margin of error for Montenegro is +/-3.81 percent and greater for subgroups

- The mood in Serbia has shifted dramatically in the aftermath of the September 24th election.
- Since his election, Vojislav Kostunica's favorability rating has shot up 14 points.
- Slobodan Milosevic, whose favorability was relatively steady in the weeks before the election, dropped by 8 points in a week.

- The current mood is one of hope and optimism. After a year and a half of complaining that opposition leaders were not unified and spent too much time fighting among themselves, people now agree that the opposition came together in the election for the good of the country.
 - 71 percent believe the Serbian opposition has finally come together for the good of the country


The driving issue in the election was the economy.

- That number may be slightly exaggerated in the exuberance of the postelection period. Some respondents may be saying they voted for the winner -- more because they wish they did than because they actually did. Nor does the number reflect the pro-Milosevic votes that came from Kosovo and Montenegro.
- Nevertheless, these numbers suggest that the 51 percent victory reported by the opposition was, if anything, low.

• Kostunica won a greater share of votes among urban voters, females, young people and wealthier people.



 More than two-thirds of respondents believe that Kostunica won the election in the first round.

- 68 percent say they believe Kostunica won in the first round
- Only 19 percent believe none of the candidates won a majority.



 Most respondents do not believe Milosevic should be handed over to the Hague War Crimes Tribunal.

The War Crimes Tribunal at the Hague has indicted Slobodan Milosevic and requests that he be handed over. Some people believe Milosevic should be handed over, others think he shouldn't. Which is closer to your view?Among Serbia respondents



- Of those who voted for Milosevic, 97 percent do not want him turned over to the Hague and 1 percent do want him turned over.
- Of those who voted for Kostunica, 42 percent do not want Milosevic turned over and 35 percent do.

- Slobodan Milosevic is extremely unpopular in Montenegro.
 - His favorable/unfavorable rating is 28/68.
 - Vojislav Kostunica's rating is 47/36.

- Nevertheless, that dissatisfaction was not reflected in the election results because of the success of the election boycott which was backed by Montenegro's leaders.
- Of our respondents, 66 percent said they boycotted the elections completely.

- As a result, the vote went overwhelmingly for Milosevic.
- The most important issues for respondents in Montenegro were "defending our independence" and "rebuilding the country."
- Asked what should be Kostunica's top priority if he comes to power, 31
 percent said "settling relations with Montenegro." The second most
 important priority was "lifting international sanctions."

Montenegro

 Montenegro respondents do not want Milosevic delivered to the Hague, by a margin of 45-30.

Major Findings

• Kostunica's favorability jumped 14 points since our last poll. Milosevic's favorability dropped by 8 points.



In the race for the federal parliament, for which party or coalition did you vote?


Among Serbian respondents who voted





• Kostunica's favorable/unfavorable rating is 47/36. Milosevic's rating is 28/68.





• Slightly more than half of respondents thought the elections were not free and fair.


