Twenty-eight* Political Parties Sign Code of Conduct For Free and Fair Elections

Skopje, Macedonia...The National Democratic Institute today announced that twenty-eight* political parties in Macedonia have signed a Code of Conduct for Free and Fair Elections. The Code was negotiated with political parties for the upcoming Parliamentary elections to be held September 15. If respected, the Code will make a strong contribution to preventing election-related violence and promoting a peaceful and stable election environment.

"It is now up to the parties to keep their commitment to citizens to conduct the campaign in a fair, non-violent way," said NDI Country Director Sheila Fruman. She added that there will be a media campaign to promote the Code because it is vitally important that citizens in Macedonia know about the Code and the commitments made by the parties for their conduct during the election. "The goal is to have an election that is without fear of violence, coercion or intimidation," she said.

The Code of Conduct for Free and Fair Elections will be monitored by Citizens Association MOST, a non-governmental organization that is planning to have observers in the polling stations on election day.

Parliamentary elections in September will be the first since the implementation of the August 2001 Ohrid Agreement that ended months of inter-ethnic conflict. The elections will mark an important moment in Macedonia's democratic transition. To promote conflict prevention and the integrity of the electoral process, NDI is working with a multi-partisan and multi-ethnic group of leading political parties on responsible election organizing, voter canvassing, and polling observation, and with MOST on a large-scale nonpartisan election monitoring initiative. The Institute will also conduct a pre-election mission. NDI's Macedonia program is funded by the U.S. Agency for International Development.
