Thirty African countries¹ are expected to hold national elections between now and the end of 2016, many of them under challenging circumstances. The conduct of these elections and their outcome could help consolidate nascent democratic institutions and practices. But if the electoral processes are viewed as flawed by a sizable percentage of the population, elections in these countries could result in violence, protracted conflict and democratic backsliding.
