

Iraqis Call on the New Government for Jobs, Services, and Reconstruction

August – October 2018 Survey Findings

Methodology Overview

- 17 August 1 October 2018
- 3804 face-to-face interviews (14,582 unweighted)
- National, covering 18 governorates; including 102 interviews from IDP camp
- Avg. MOE +/-: 1.6% national; 4.8% Baghdad; 1.8% South (Babil, Basra, Kerbala, Missan, Najaf,
 Qadisiyah, Wassit); 2.4% West (Anbar, Diyala, Kirkuk, Ninewa, Salahaddin); 3.1% Kurdish Region of
 Iraq (KRI)
- Representative by gender, age, education, urban/rural
- Multi-stage cluster sampling; probability proportional to size sampling down to block level in urban areas; simple random sampling at rural village selection and house/individual level
- Half and quarter split samples were used on select questions for testing purposes or to reduce the survey length
- Implementation team: NDI, JPM Strategic Solutions, GQR, IIACSS
- 14th national survey in Iraq conducted by team dating back to 2010; 2nd national survey conducted by team this year



Key findings

- 1. Country mood more pessimistic, driven by increasing frustration in services and lingering job concerns in West and South.
- 2. Smaller majority perceive security is improving, as concerns toward ISIS or terrorism-related violence increase.
- 3. Low trust in government institutions and low confidence in elections drive perceptions that Iraq is more divided and drive support for protests.
- 4. Most see Shia-Sunni relations as improving.
- 5. Role of women in Iraq at pivot point. Strong demand for equal rights that are not being delivered. Some differences in views by gender.
- 6. High expectations on government to create jobs, while most see bribes and connections are necessary to get a government job.




Country mood worsens, especially in West



Country mood worsening especially in West


Generally speaking, do you think that things in Iraq are going in the right direction, or do you think things are going in the wrong direction?

Generally speaking, do you think that things in lraq are going in the right direction, or do you think things are going in the wrong direction?








But views toward governorates in West more positive

And generally speaking, do you think that things in (Province/KRI) are going in the right direction, or do you think things are going in the wrong direction?






Satisfaction and expectations down outside KRI

Thinking specifically about your life now compared to 6 months ago, would you say you are more or less satisfied now than compared to 6 months ago?




Thinking specifically about your life, do you expect things to get better for you or worse for you over the next 6 months.





Access to basic services worsening, especially in South



Growing majority in West say reconstruction efforts worse

















This wave: Do you think the May 2018 Iraqi parliamentary elections were mostly free and fair or mostly NOT free and fair?



Views of fairness of upcoming provincial elections just as poor


Based on what you know, will the upcoming provincial elections be mostly free and fair or not mostly free and fair?





Election reforms focused on counting increases trust





Trust in Iraqi government drops in West and South




Mixed views on effectiveness of protests



Fewer Iraqis view security as getting better





Based on what you know, which ONE of the following do you feel is the biggest threat to your day to day security?






High and growing violence concerns, especially in South






Concerns also increase for PMUs and Army violence










Majority feel other components get more services



Division not on sectarian lines; Sunni-Shia relations seen as improving








Pluralities want government jobs over private jobs












Bribes and connections for government jobs






Some openness to women rights, but with limits



Strong support for "equal rights" for women as a concept






Majority think Iraq stronger with women in workforce

It is <u>not culturally appropriate</u> for women to pursue jobs outside the house.






Men more resistant to women working when jobs limited




Majority prefer a lesser role for women in government, business

Men should have a greater role in running the government/business and industry.






Only young women more likely to say they can represent themselves



When it came time to vote in the May 2018 election, which of the following were the TWO main factors that determined how you voted?






More blame families than society for holding women back




