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NDI-partners Develop Anti-Ebola Plans with 16 Communities

Guinea, Liberia and Sierra Leone were most severely affected by the Ebola outbreak. According to the World Health Organization (WHO), this is largely because all three countries share many common challenges shaped by geography and poverty. In January 2015, the Liberia Ministry of Health released its latest statistics indicating 3,613 Liberians died from Ebola since the outbreak began. Initial efforts by the Government of Liberia to curb the disease fell short, due to lack of financial resources and technical capacity. Further there was no emergency plan in place to address a crisis of this scale. Once communities began taking steps to prevent infections, cases began dropping. Although the WHO warns that Ebola has moved from Monrovia to rural, less controlled areas, "it seems that the collective national and international efforts to beat Ebola have been successful." The WHO attributes this primarily to community based initiatives which it describes as "the linchpin for successful control" of Ebola-response measures.

In line with this, NDI supported its three civil society advocacy partners (NRM, WASH and SEWODA) to develop community-based action plans with 16 communities in 6 counties across the country (see box below).

The plans provide an assessment of each community and identify ways to:

- strengthen the Ebola taskforce in the community;
- educate the public and raise awareness;
- conduct surveillance, contact tracing, and discuss emergency responses in the community;

- integrate gender into community-based approaches to addressing Ebola; and
- encourage community engagement with legislators;

Each plan also highlights tailored, community follow up items for the post-Ebola period.

NRM, WASH and SEWODA are implementing community-based action plans in these communities:

NRM (CSO Consortium on Natural Resource Management):

- Montserrado County (Brewerville, Caldwell, 72nd, King Gray)
- Bong County (Civil Compound, Millionaire Quarter)

WASH (Liberia CSOs Water, Sanitation & Hygiene Network):

- Montserrado County (Chicken Soup Factory, Barnersville, St. Philip Community)
- Bomi County (Vai Town)
- Margibi County (Dolo's Town)

SEWODA (Southeastern Women Development Association):

- Maryland County (Old Sodoken, Rocktown)
- River Gee County (Fishtown, Glaro Free Town, Tienpo)

Intensive Brainstom Sessions

The community-based action plans were developed during intensive brainstorming sessions, involving community leaders, citizens, and community based organizations

(CBOs). NDI's three partners worked with their networks to obtain buy-in from community leaders for the development of each plan.

During one of the brainstorming sessions in the Chicken Soup Factory Community (Gardnersvill, Montserrado), Representative Richmond Anderson said denial, complacency and lack of education to battle the virus resulted in the huge death toll. He further explained: "We didn't have the skills to fight the virus, it claims lives, we have to educate our communities on the prevention of the virus."

In the remote region of Southeastern Liberia, a brainstorm session was held in Old Sodoken, Maryland County. SEWODA received feedback from citizens indicating that

since the Ebola outbreak, there had been no taskforce established to coordinate the response in their region. As one of the participants underlined, "this is the very first time a CSO is here to discuss and share with the community dwellers their action plan on the fight against Ebola."

In each of the 16 communities, animators (point persons) have been identified by NDI's partners to work with community leaders, and the community at large, to implement each action plan. The animators explain steps to take when there is a suspected case of Ebola, and distribute flyers, posters and other materials to provide additional information about the identification, treatment and prevention of Ebola in communities. The animators pay specific attention to vulnerable groups, such as orphans and Ebola-survivors, who are often stigmatized.

The communities with plans in place are eagerly waiting for information from animators to begin implementation. Anthony Lee, Chairman of Swagger Island Block Community in Montserrado County, pledged his community's readiness and cooperation to animators that will be deployed in the community to educate residents on the disease.

Now that all 16 plans have been developed, NDI's partners are beginning preparations for legislative advocacy on areas identified as priorities for each community.

Jingle: Ebola is killing people

Besides posters, leaflets and cartoons, SEWODA specifically developed jingles that are aired on community radio stations to raise awareness about Ebola. Radio programs are among the most effective communication tools in this remote part of the country. SEWODA staff also sing the jingle during their awareness raising activities. It is first sung in English, followed by three local languages: Kru, Grebo, and Kpelle. The English version is below.

Come and see something, Ebola is killing people. No Shaking hands No hugging No bathing dead bodies. Ebola is killing people

No eating monkey or bushmeat.

There is no medicine

You have to prevent yourself

And prevent your family from getting Ebola

Ebola is killing people

The signs and symptoms of Ebola are:

Headache

Fever

Sore throat

Running stomach

Rash

Vomiting

Toileting with blood

If you see these signs you must report to the health center or call 1284
Then the health people will come for you
Ebola is killing people
